WONDERMENTS FROM PASTOR WAYNE'S WORLD

I wonder if everyone knows we have Stations of the Cross posted along the walls of the sanctuary. I wonder also if everyone knows we have traditionally had the Stations of the Cross re-enacted at noon on Good Friday. In the 13th century St. Francis and the Franciscans were the ones who first began to advocate for the stations, but it was not until William Wey, an English pilgrim who visited the Holy Land, described pilgrims following the footsteps of Christ to the cross, did it become practiced. Then in 1521 a book called *Geystlich Strass* (German for spiritual road) was printed in Jerusalem with illustration of the stations. Thus, from 1686 to 1857 popes Innocent XI and Clement XII and English bishops authorized use of stations in churches.

Originally there were 14: 1. Jesus is condemned to death, 2. Jesus carries his cross, 3. Jesus falls the first time, 4. Jesus meets His mother, 5. Simon of Cyrene helps Jesus carry His cross, 6. Veronica wipes the face of Jesus, 7. Jesus falls the second time, 8. Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem, 9. Jesus fall the third time, Jesus is stripped of His garments, 11. Jesus is nailed to the cross, 12. Jesus dies on the cross, 13. Jesus is taken down from the cross, 14. Jesus is laid in the tomb. Stations 3, 4, 6, 7, and 9 are not attested to in Scripture. Jesus did not fall, nor is there any woman in Scripture named Veronica although the devotion of one woman could symbolize the devotion of all women. Although it made for good "Hollywood" drama, Jesus did not meet His mother. If she did meet Him, she might have said something like this, "You stop all this Messiah talk and come home right now."

In 1991, Pope John Paul II authorized new form of devotion called the Scriptural Way of the Cross on Good Friday. Still 14, here are the Scriptural Stations. 1. Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane, 2. Jesus is betrayed by Judas and arrested, 3. Jesus is condemned by the Sanhedrin, 4. Jesus is denied by Peter, 5. Jesus is judged by Pilate, 6. Jesus is scourged and crowned with thorns, 7. Jesus takes up His cross, 8. Jesus is helped by Simon of Cyrene to carry his cross, 9. Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem, 10. Jesus is crucified, 11. Jesus promises His kingdom to the repentant thief, 12. Jesus entrusts Mary and John to each other, 13. Jesus dies on the cross, 14. Jesus is laid in the tomb.

In the Philippines where men re-enact the crucifixion, the

Catholic Conference of Bishops authorized another "Mostly Scripturally-based Stations". 1. The Last Supper, 2. The Agony in Gethsemane, 3. Jesus is condemned to death, 4. Jesus is scourged and crowned with thorns, 5. Jesus carries the cross, 6. Jesus falls under weight of the cross, 7. Simon of Cyrene helps Jesus carry the cross, 8. Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem, 9. Jesus is nailed to the cross, 10. The good thief, 11. Mary and John at the foot of the cross, 12. Jesus dies on the cross, 13. Jesus is laid in the tomb, 14. Jesus rises from death. The "traditionally Stations" did occasionally include a "15th station", the Resurrection.

These three "ways of the Cross" are good devotional practices during Holy Week. Use one, two or all three and experience how our Lord suffered for us.

At the meeting of the Altar Guild on April 8, silver was polished and furniture was dusted and polished.

We are rapidly approaching the end off Lent (40 days since Ash Wednesday). Lent has two primary themes, baptism and penitence. The Lord's passion is the focus of Holy Week.

“The first day of Holy week is the Sunday of the Passion, also known as Palm Sunday. The mood of this day, reflecting its double name is a mixture of triumph and tragedy. We observe both Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem as well as his death on the cross. Palms will be distributed. Paraments are scarlet, the dark red color of the crucifixion, and are uniquely used during most of Holy Week.

“Maundy Thursday recalls Jesus’ example of loving service and his institution of the eucharist during the Last Supper in the upper room. The name of the day is from the Latin word *mandatum*, which means command. It refers to Jesus' words at the Last Supper, 'I give you new commandment, that you love one another, just as I have loved you, you also should love one another' (John 13:34).

“Good Friday, the original name of this day was probably God's Friday. It is a day to celebrate the sacrifice on the cross of Christ, our Passover Lamb. The altar may be draped with a black cloth or remain bare,

“Easter, the Festival of the Resurrection of Our Lord is the queen of all Christian festivals, and all preparations for its celebration should make its unique significance apparent. White paraments are used during the 50 days of the Easter season. The paschal candle will be placed at the left side of the altar from Easter through Pentecost. The paschal candle will be lighted for all worship services as a reminder of the unity of these fifty days of celebration.”¹

Able to Serve Mother’s Day Brunch

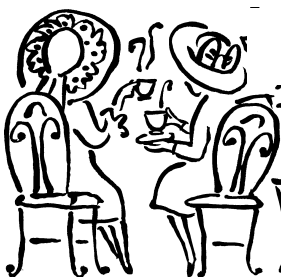

Parish Committee

One of the responsibilities of the Parish Committee is to encourage environmental stewardship. As Christians we are called to care for God's creation. By awareness of and appreciation for the natural wonders of the earth, we can lead by example of best practices. Please consider some or all of the following as ways to be good stewards of our Creator's world.

Practice conservation: This can be as simple as protecting water resources by using partial instead of full tap water flow or saving energy by remembering to turn off lights when you leave a room .

Recycle what can be repurposed: Many trash collectors have separate bins for glass, paper, cardboard and other recyclables. Take advantage of this repurposing by keeping a separate trash bin in your house just for recyclables. You will be amazed at how many household products come in recyclable containers as you empty your home recyclables into the trash collector bin.



Plant a tree: Trees replenish the air, protect soil from erosion, and are a great source of shade for homes in the summer months. Don't have a yard? Consider a donation to the Arbor Day Foundation or another charity that sponsors tree planting or forest renourishment.

Transportation : Try to combine trips by car when possible to save on fossil fuels. Better yet, walk or ride a bike which protects the environment and also helps you keep physically fit.

Protect wildlife: Animals are an essential part of our ecosystems and you can help by volunteering for forest, park, river or beach cleanup projects that protect the physical environment on which animals are dependent.

If you attended the recent called congregational meeting held to inform members about the need for a new roof you know Tim Clark and the Property Committee spent many hours discussing the problem and working on a solution. Originally, thought to be a leaking problem that could be repaired turned out to be a major one, an entire new roof needed. Estimates were sought, pictures taken of the roof damage, and making a final decision as to the course to be taken.

The original cost of getting the job done was a staggering \$25,000! On further study and discussions it was determined that the roof had damage from a former hail storm. That made it an insurance question, As you know at the meeting all of this was talked about and when cost was announced, greatly reduced, a vote was taken to approve having the work done. The color of the shingles and trim was decided on and the work was to begin right away. The committee breathed a sigh of relief.

While the roof problem took up most of the committee's time and energy this past month, work was going on in other areas. Gerry Havenstein and Gray Anthony spent a full afternoon making the parking lot island flower planter beautiful. As you turn off Aversboro Road into our parking lot the first thing you see is the planter. It catches your eye immediately. They trimmed the rose bushes, cut back other plants, and cleaned and disposed of leaves, cuttings, and sticks. All in a days work.

The caring of the property and the buildings is an on going thing. The building is aging and other repairs and replacements are needed. Next on the agenda is replacing a heat pump. You will read and hear more about that in bulletins and next month's newsletter. Every member of this committee is doing something at sometime to make Your church presentable and welcoming. They all deserve an 'atta boy!'

Lion: a review

When the movie *Lion* ended the person I saw the movie with said something like this: "If someone wants to know what a real family is, watch this movie." It elicited that type of response. It is a wonderful, true story about family, actually two families: Saroo's family from India which encompasses the first half of the film when



5-year-old Saroo is played beautifully by Sunny Pawar, and his Australian family 20 years later when Saroo is played equally well by Dev Patel.

Most would say it is a two part movie which then blends the two parts at the end. The first part is all India first introducing 5-year-old Saroo and his family, namely his mother who takes on manual labor so her family can survive, and his older brother, Guddu, who is the "Wally" of Saroo's "Beaver". Guddu took care of Saroo and Saroo looked up to him.

The first part of the movie showed Saroo's India in a "no holds barred" kind of way not touching up the harsh conditions they lived under. Poverty forced the family, including Guddu and Saroo, to use any means -- cunning, hard work, and long hours -- to make money for their survival. It was all shown from ground level, the level of a 5-year-old boy. In a good news, bad news, kind of way, the first half is dominated by bad news for Saroo.

However, he is adopted by an Australian couple who bring him to their home in Australia and a new life, and the second part of the film is mainly filled with good news. He receives an education and is successful in business and in the standard romance. Still he cannot forget his life in India wondering about his mother, brother and sister. "Accidentally" leaving as a 5-year-old, he could not even know where exactly he left from. Encouraged by friends and with a little help from Google, like in his business he is successful. I will leave it at that because if we have our spiritual cinema series again this summer, *Lion* will be on the schedule.

I personally could not help but think about my daughter, Claire, and her biological mother. Her mother knew her future, greeted Anne Marie and me at the hearing, knowingly gave her over to us. Saroo, as a young man in Australia knew that for his mother and brother he was a missing person; they did not know what had happened to him. He had to change that.

I highly recommend this film. It deserved its nomination for best picture, Patel and Kidman for best supporting actors; nonetheless, bring tissues and make sure you stay all the way until the end. You will not know why it is called "Lion" until the very end.
