WONDERMENTS FROM PASTOR WAYNE'S WORLD

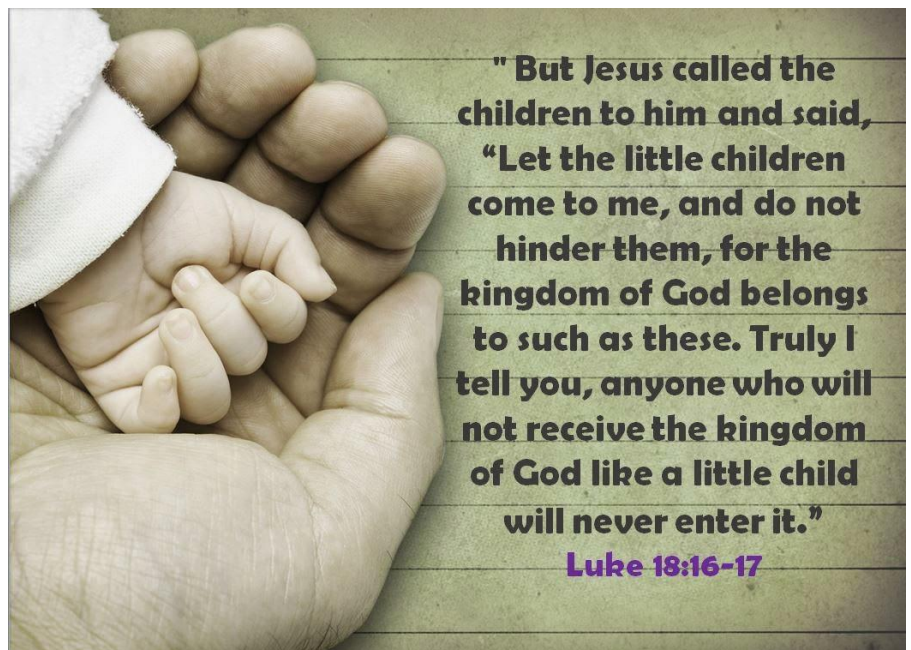
Most of you know that March 24th I quickly left after worship in order to worship with one of my students and her family. I quickly drove to Selma to Temple Baptist Church where a small, intimate group of Hispanic-speaking Christians worshipped in a mobile unit. Before going, I checked out the Temple Baptist website and did not see any mention of a Hispanic ministry. I surmise that it is because the church feels the Hispanic congregation is part of the greater ministry of Temple Baptist. This is different than La Vos de Dios Iglesias who use our facility for worship and fellowship. We have a space set aside for them on our sign outside.

Back to the Temple Baptist website, under "beliefs" it is stated "We believe in the resurrection of both the saved and the lost; those who are saved unto the resurrection of life, and those who are not unto the resurrection of damnation." This derives from the gospel of John chapter 5. In an earlier statement of belief, it is stated that "...only by God's grace through faith alone are we saved." Good Lutheran style belief. The notion of the resurrection of damnation for those who are lost is what raises my eyebrows. I am not merely talking of those who have not had the opportunity to hear about the Good News of Jesus Christ. I am talking about my student whom I observed sitting and standing, sitting and standing, and sitting and standing again quietly while worship was going on for 2 hours. I am talking about another one of my students who sat quietly through the funeral of his brother, who was tragically killed in a car accident. I am talking about my recent

graduate who worshipped with us 2 years ago, and I was proud to give the bread and wine of communion to her. Although my student's cognitive abilities are severely limited, I do not doubt their unique faith in Jesus instilled in them by the Holy Spirit which gives them a special relationship with God.

Jesus in the gospel of Luke says, "Let the little children come to Me. Do not stop them. For theirs is the kingdom of heaven. My students are children cognitively. They will always be. Yet the gospel writer tells us that "to enter the kingdom of heaven we must be like children. I thank God daily for my childlike students who are smiling and laughing and simply enjoying life to the best of their abilities while they await their eternal life with God their Father and their Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

From the desk of your congregation council:

The Lord of Life Church Council met for the monthly meeting on March 10th. The Annual Planning meeting was scheduled and held in February in lieu of a Council meeting. Regular business included review of committee reports, financial reports, and minutes.

In the financial discussion, Council voted to move its support from the Randy Tallent Global Church support to the Synod because Randy has completed his ministry in Japan. Becky researched and Council voted on a new financial tracking system called Parish Soft that will provide cloud-based, secure payroll and accounting function. Council agreed that this system is overdue, and necessary. Costs include \$1,650 for initial training and software setup, and \$775 thereafter. Council named Terry Barnes as the Financial Secretary and voted on adding him as a signatory on banking documents. Council also discussed and is pursuing a financial audit committee from inside the Congregation to conduct an audit per the LOL Constitution.

Council also put together a team to review and make suggestions for update of the LOL Constitution. There are sections that are outdated and require review. These suggestions will be proposed at the 2020 LOL Full Congregation meeting.

Council voted to use the Herb Liebsch Memorial Fund to purchase a new set of chimes. These chimes have been out of service for the last year and their replacement comes with an install and warranty. Council is grateful for this generous donation and honors the memory of Herb with this gift.

Other topics that were discussed include a potential Congregational donation of an ice machine, lighting in the back of the church, and the need for more Council and Congregational involvement with worship assistant and other volunteering during worship.

Thank you to Deanna Leuenberger for setting the altar for March. Thank you to all the people who help with clearing the altar and preparing for the next service.

We are rapidly approaching the celebration of Easter. Holy week services will commence on Palm Sunday and continue through the celebration of Easter (April 21). A list for Easter flowers will be posted in the next few days, at this time the cost is unknown.

There will be a meeting of the altar guild on Saturday, April 13th, the Saturday prior to Palm Sunday, in the library at 10 am. At that time we will also clean and polish all silver and brass in preparation for the celebrations the following week.

Altar cloths for Palm Sunday will be red, and on Good Friday there will be nothing on the Altar. The color for Easter will be gold.

The Paschal candle (sometimes called the Easter Candle) will be placed at the left side of the altar through the Easter season. The Paschal candle symbolizes the Lord's glorious Easter triumph over the darkness of death and sin. It is reminiscent of the pillar of cloud and the fire that led the people of God to the promised land.

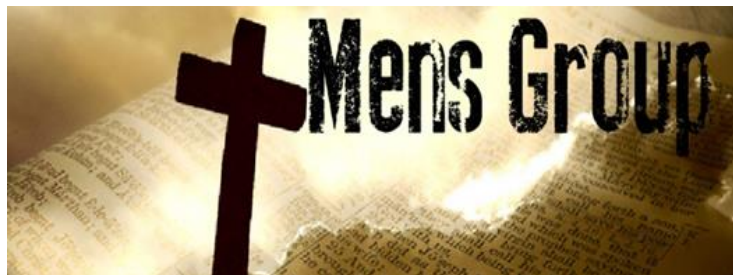

For many churches, Good Friday is the final service of Holy Week, followed by Maundy Thursday and Palm Sunday. Other churches hold an Easter Vigil on Saturday night to bring the light of Christ back into the church.

"So, what do you think? With God on our side like this, how can we lose? If God didn't hesitate to put everything on the line for us, embracing our condition and exposing himself to the worst by sending his own Son, is there anything else he wouldn't gladly and freely do for us? And who would dare tangle with God by messing with one of God's chosen? Who would dare even to point a finger? The One who died for us—who was raised to life for us!—is in the presence of God at this very moment sticking up for us. Do you think anyone is going to be able to drive a wedge between us and Christ's love for us? There is no way! Not trouble, not hard times, not hatred, not hunger, not homelessness, not bullying threats, not backstabbing, not even the worst sins listed in Scripture:

They kill us in cold blood because they hate you. We're sitting ducks; they pick us off one by one.

Your Social Concerns committee spends much of their meeting time discussing the needs of the community. We have identified needs that we are unable to address. But overall, we feel confident that we are getting the most bang for our buck with the ministries that we support. And we thank the congregation for your help in this mission.

Our collections for Garner Area Ministries continues to grow strong. Pastor Wayne recently mentioned in his sermon that the baskets are filled quietly and then delivered quietly to Garner Area Ministries. Thanks to ALL who fill and deliver what is collected weekly! They can use ANYTHING! So we will have a general collection of anything during the month of April. We will focus on breakfast foods in May and kid foods in June since many children will be out of school during those months. But again, anything is appreciated!

The Relay for Life Fundraiser will be on April 6th from 5-7 pm in the fellowship hall. We will start with the Reverse Raffle. Seventy-five cards will be removed from the board one at a time. The last 2 cards on the board are winners. The second winner-up will receive \$10 and the Grand Prize winner will receive \$50. We will also have barbecue sandwiches from Ole Time Barbecue for sale, as well as a Silent Auction. Final bids will be accepted on Sunday and prizes awarded during the fellowship hour. Silent Auction items can be dropped off at the church after Rotary on Wednesday, April 3rd. Check your house for any items that you no longer want to bring for the silent auction! You may make a donation to the American Cancer Society, but I would rather you NOT purchase something for the Silent Auction.

We also discussed a way to honor Peg Stamp as she is in the middle of her cancer treatment. We decided to donate \$100 from the Social Concerns committee and ask the congregation for a love offering for that last 2 Sundays in March. We raised \$76 on March 24th. Thank you to our VERY generous congregation!

The RELAY will be held at Lake Benson Park on Friday, April 26th until Saturday, April 27th. It is a carnival like atmosphere on Friday night with each team selling items at their campsites and food in the cooking section. There are things going on all night. Lots of music on Friday night, karaoke until midnight. Then a midnight movie on the outdoor screen. There is also the Miss Relay pageant where young men dress up as beauty pageant contestants to include dresses and high heels. They walk around the track asking for donation for whomever you think is best dressed. Whoever collects the most money wins the crown for

the night. This year we are adding the Prince and Princess breakfast on Saturday morning. The Garner High School drama department will wear costumes and mingle among the guests. We will have the Survivor's Reception at 5 pm and the traditional opening of the Relay at 6 pm, Luminary Ceremony at 9 pm and Closing Ceremony around 10:30 am. I will need walkers, campsite people, set up and clean up. Look for sign-up sheets in the fellowship hall. I will also try to be more timely in putting up notices about fellow teams pre-Relay fundraisers.

The 4th Annual Able to Serve Mother's Day Brunch will be held on Tuesday, May 7th at 9 am. Helen is organizing a group for cooking and cleaning for this group. Please let Helen know if you are able to assist with this brunch for the Mother's of the ATS participants. The participants work on gifts for their Mother's and give a short poem or song to honor their Mom or caregiver. Some sisters have taken over the duty to caring for their sibling after their parents have died. It is a wonderful sight to see the love and support in this room for everyone in attendance!

The camp scholarship applications are out and due on April 15th. We will review these applications at our April meeting.

Alecia will offer a CPR familiarization class on Friday, May 3rd in the fellowship hall at 7 pm. All are welcomed to attend.

And finally, your Social Concerns committee continues to pray for specific needs within the church and people in need. We are blessed to have such a loving Lord of Life family!

ROMA: A REVIEW

I think it's rather clear to anyone who has seen "The Fault of our Stars", that "Five Feet Apart" IS "The Fault of our Stars" - except the disease is Cystic Fibrosis, not cancer. Both movies have a couple in love who know their lives will be cut short, and one of the three dies. Nonetheless, there is still much to be gained by seeing "Five Feet Apart".

Firstly, much of the movie is set in the hospital where Poe, Will, and Stella are there for "tune ups" so they can have the best quality of life. Since it is in the



hospital, we are given some insight into what the regiments of these young people need to be. Twenty-five years ago I had the honor of working with teens managing their diabetes and I

came away with much admiration for them as you will for those living with cystic fibrosis if you see this film. Haley Lu Richardson, who plays Stella, tells how she was inspired by Claire Wineland, a teen with cystic fibrosis, whom she consulted with about the movie. Claire has since died. Richardson says they incorporated one of Claire's sayings into the film.

"There comes a time when you stop living for your treatments and do your treatments so you can live."

Secondly, the film begins and ends with some "sermonizing", that is, the importance of touch between humans. However, when touch and even close proximity is prohibited between those with cystic fibrosis; hugging, holding hands, and kissing which we take for granted are especially missed. The point made is that we who are able to be physically close to each other need to take advantage of that wonderful gift we have; to be able to have physical contact with others.

Thirdly, the relationships portrayed and the actors playing Stella, Will and Poe were very believable with very human, realistic emotions. Two of them are Disney child actors growing up. Cole Sprouse was on the Suite Life of Zack and Cody with his twin brother. Moises Arias was a regular in the Hannah Montana series. Although she has been in other movies, this is Haley Lu Richardson's first starring role. They all have proved we will see them in future movies. They carry this movie.

There is little cussing in the film even though Stella, Will, and Poe drew short sticks for their lives. The subject is a tough one, so it is not appropriate for children. However I would recommend it because these three young people certainly live their lives to the fullest.

Easter Imagination

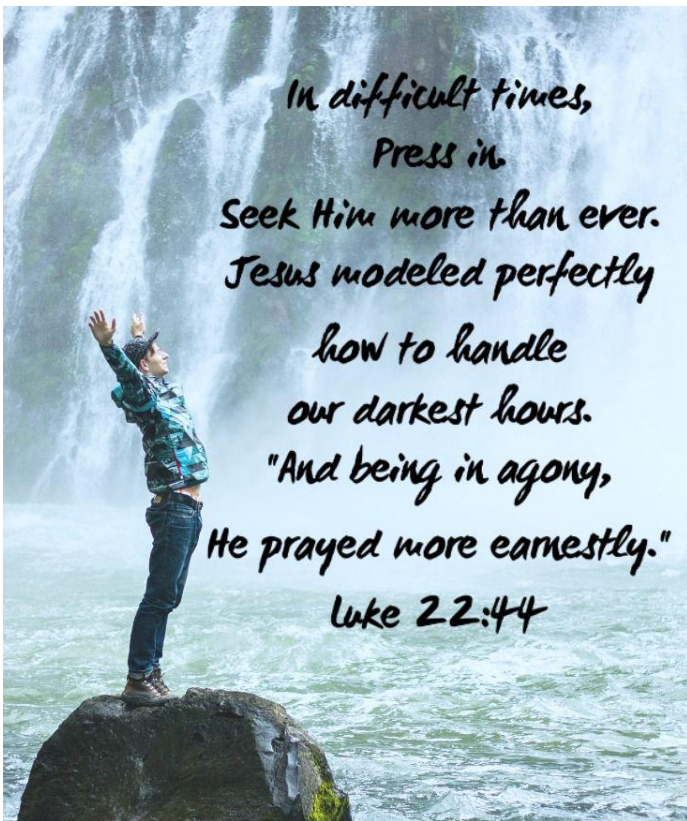
The news of Easter is that in the resurrection of Jesus, God has broken all the vicious cycles of deathliness in which the world finds itself. The lyric of Isaiah 65:17-25 anticipates that weary *old heaven*, jaded *old earth*, and conflicted *old Jerusalem* will be broken open by the power of God to new, healthy possibility.

What the poetry of Isaiah anticipates, the early church confesses. The Easter narrative of John 20 provides an early attestation about the “seeing” and “believing” of the first Easter, first reported by the uncredentialed women and then verified by the credentialed male apostles. The news of this new aliveness is breathtaking; Mary’s declaration, “I have seen the Lord,” is one of bewilderment and

astonishment (John 20:18). Neither she nor her companions could explain what had happened because they had no categories for this exhibit of God’s power for life. The narrative portrays a deep, singular event that defies all of our modern categories of explanation.

It is this singular event on which the church stakes its life and its witness. Paul testifies about the defeat of “the last enemy . . . death” (1 Corinthians 15:26). Peter witnesses to the gift of forgiveness given in Easter (Acts 10:43). Easter invites us to imagine, embrace, and live in a world that is without fear of *death* or *guilt*.

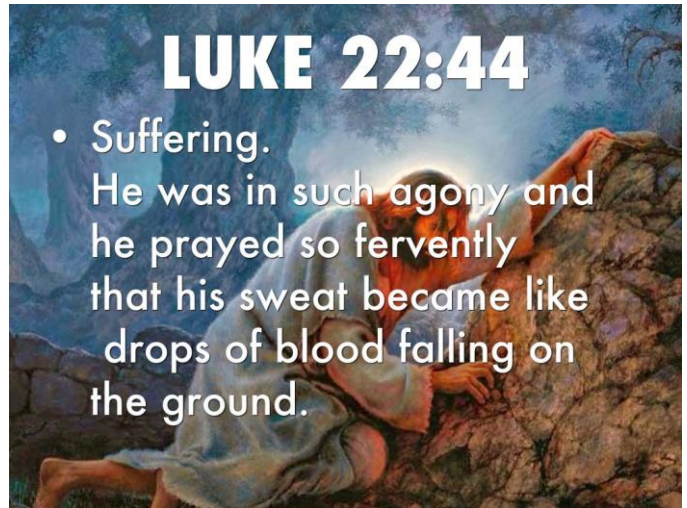


Tis' the Story (of Sacrifice)

This is about a story. I decided on this title because we always use "*Tis the Season*" during the Christmas observance. To me, Lent and Easter embody a bit more than a 'season'... it's the holiest time of the year and, as such, it is the epitome of what constitutes a story. This story however, is not my favorite liturgical time of year. It's filled with soooo much pain, and anguish, and sacrifice. First we have the doubt and betrayal; then the prosecution; following that, the crucifixion; and then the Resurrection. And there is no way that we cannot feel our involvement in this epic story! Through Lent we see our role in Jesus's suffering; we come face-to-face with our humanity as we confess that the darkness of sin still dwells in us even, and so very long after the Supreme Sacrifice has been made.

During Holy Week it is difficult to accept the things that happened between Palm Sunday and Easter (I can't seem to reconcile this story as Jesus's passion). Jesus went all alone to pray to God in the Garden of Gethsemane; he sought release from his imminent destiny. As he was praying and agonizing "*his sweat became like great drops of blood falling down on the ground*" (Luke 22:44). In the midst of all this, his disciples fell asleep as they waited for him. I can imagine that upon awakening their remorse was probably the darkest aspect of their collective lives.

We, too, almost certainly would have fallen asleep just as his disciples did, AND we probably would also have denied knowing him as he silently accepted his death sentence. For the disciples it was a period of bleak reality they just "didn't get it." They fall asleep, betray, deny, and run away! Not good, BUT, they witnessed their Lord and Savior arrested, beaten, humiliated, and nailed to a cross! It appeared Holy Week was anything but!



Is there no joy in this story?! It's downright heartbreaking! The idea though, (tough as it is) is to reflect on and embrace the supreme sacrifice... to feel just a tiny bit of the pain of this story which in and of itself pulls us closer to God. This story is supremely sacred in large part because it forces our attention on the true meaning of sacrifice, and the reality that nothing we can ever do can remotely come close. I'm so happy when Easter finally comes... it provides a palpable relief... HE AROSE! No more torment; no more agony; no more tears!

It's Sunday, and the crucified and resurrected Christ has defeated death, hell, sin and the grave. It's Sunday and now everything has changed. It's the age of grace for us all.
