



WONDERMENTS FROM PASTOR WAYNE'S WORLD

October is the month when we celebrate the Reformation. Growing up we would actually worship on Reformation Day, October 31st, joining the other Lutheran Churches in my hometown of Bristol, Connecticut. That was a good thing; however, it was done in a manner that said we had something special. We were Lutherans, not just protestant, we were set apart.

That is true . . . we do think or theologize differently from other protestants, even though our history goes back to when we were considered protestant before being called Lutheran. In fact, the baseball cap I purchased in Wittenberg, Germany - the city where Luther posted his 95 theses - states "Protestant since 1517". Nonetheless, that does not make us any better than other protestants, just maybe we think slightly differently.


Let's look at just one somewhat simple way we look at theology. We use the word "and" often.

Martin stressed the Law AND Gospel. The Law, simply put, is what we should AND should not do. What we do, but should not do, are sins of "COMMISSION". We commit acts contrary to God's will. Sins of Omission are that which we should do, but don't. The Good Samaritan parable gives us a good example of that. A man is injured on the road, and the priest and Levite do nothing to help the man. By so doing they were guilty of the sin of omission, the one who robbed and beat the man was guilty of the sin of commission. For we Lutherans the purpose of the Law is to keep AND to drive us to the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The general notion for Lutherans is we are bound by sin AND death; but, because of Christ's sacrifice on the Cross we are freed from sin AND death. Thus, we are "simul justis et peccator" - Latin for "at the same time saint and sinner". Saint by the grace of God in Jesus Christ, sinner by virtue of our human nature. Thus, we are subject to the condemnation of the Law AND redeemed from that condemnation through the mercy of God.

Probably what most sets us apart from other protestants is this: We see the outward symbols AND liturgical structure of Catholicism. That connects us to the historic AND traditional aspects of the Christian Church. This Reformation month, let us remember our Lutheran heritage AND theology as we, this Lutheran community of faith, give thanks AND praise to our Lord AND Savior Jesus Christ.

PEANUT BUTTER FALCON: A REVIEW

Zak is a 22 year old man with Down syndrome living in a nursing home. We do not know why. His family, or lack thereof, is never mentioned. Tyler is a 32 year old man who finds trouble, or trouble finds him. Zak escapes from his nursing home, apparently after several attempts. Tyler is running from "colleagues" from whom he helped himself to crabs from their crab pots.

Zak hides in Tyler's boat; Tyler does not realize it until he has put distance between himself and his pursuers.

So they meet, and Zak won't leave Tyler much to Tyler's chagrin. Tyler just wants to stay safe, Zak has a more important goal, to get to Salt Water Redneck's wrestling school. Zak had been watching Salt Water Redneck's wrestling school advertisement for as long as he could remember. Tyler eventually promised to get him there.

But here is the North Carolina connection. They begin their Mark Twain/Huck Finn journey in Manteo, North Carolina, and the school is in Ayden, North Carolina; and they will travel the North Carolina waterways to get there. Zak is actually a 32 year old actor, Zak Gottsagen, "God says" with Down syndrome who is a very good actor, but I must warn you: he is only in his underwear for the first part of his

journey because he had to "slip" through the bars of his window in the nursing home. The role of Tyler is described as Labeouf's most heartfelt performance as an actor. You just have to see the movie to grasp the special relationship between Tyler and Zak.

Dakota Johnson plays the social worker, Eleanor, who is tasked with bringing Zak back, but gives in to their adventure and joins the journey. John Hawkes plays the most kindhearted wrestler who comes out of retirement to "train" Zak so he could fulfill his dream. Bruce Dern plays Carl, who aids and abets Zak's escape from the nursing home.

The film is very realistic as a young man with Down syndrome is obsessed with one and only one thing ... wrestling, and not just meeting Salt Water Redneck, but training with him, even though the tape he constantly watched could be 10 to 15 years old. Also it is very realistic that Tyler and even Eleanor could "fall for Zak and support his goal however unrealistic. So do they all live happily ever after with Zak making millions on the wrestling circuit? You will just have to see the movie to find out. See it you must, if not in the theater, at Lord of Life's Spiritual Cinema next summer. You might also find out the reason for the movie's title.



Halloween... Where'd That Come From?

After seeing an "It's the Great Pumpkin, Charlie Brown," advertisement on TV last week (in the company of a fifth-grader), I was asked from where Halloween came. I was momentarily dumbfounded and in that brief lapse of thought, I semi-fabricated something about a pumpkin patch (shoulder shrug) as an alternative to me creating an on-the-spot tale of black magic-witches-and-goblins. It was only then, at that moment in time, after all my MANY years of living & learning, did I come to the realization that, apparently, it was a question that I had never considered... nor had I ever heard anyone pose the answer to such! For an instant, I wished for my Encyclopedia Britannica (don't laugh because I know that, back in the day, y'all had a set too!). Instead, I logged onto my trusty PC to find the answer to the origin of Halloween in a nutshell.

What I found might be a refresher to you, but it's an introduction to the I-don't-know folk like me. It's traced back to an ancient Celtic festival that served as an October 31st new year's eve holiday precursor to the Celts' November 1st new year's day; this marked the end of summer and the start of winter. Winter was a season associated with all things lifeless, dark, and dreary primarily because of the unimaginable cold wherein people actually froze to death; so, people began the custom of wearing costumes to ward off the bad spirits and ghosts of the dead.

With the spread of Christianity in the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated November 1st as a time to honor the dead instead of being afraid of their spirits. Presto! With the influence of Christianity, *All Hallows Eve* (October 31st) became the forerunner for *All Saints Day (November 1st)*. It was

simply a matter of establishing a belief in something and amending that belief to fit a circumstance.

No one shall be found among you who makes a son or daughter pass through fire, or who practices divination, or is a soothsayer, or an augur, or a sorcerer, or one who casts spells, or who consults ghosts or spirits, or who seeks oracles from the dead. For whoever does these things is abhorrent to the Lord; it is because of such abhorrent practices that the Lord your God is driving them out before you.

- Deuteronomy 18:10-12

At its inception, I guess it wasn't easy to make the leap from thinking of the frozen dead as harmful ghosts and spirits to a mindset of <u>honoring</u> the dead. Many, many years passed.

Fast forward to America... old Halloween practices that involved spells & black magic gradually lost most of their superstitious and religious overtones and thus, their appeal. This was due in large part to an amalgamation of the belief-systems and customs of the Native Americans and the belief-systems and customs of the many European ethnic groups who infiltrated the Native Americans' environment.

So, here we are... ready for the candy; ready for a range of costumes from ghouls & goblins to fairies & princesses... to biker chicks and witches. Oh, and let's not forget the pumpkin! It's time for Trunk or Treat... bring on the kids!!
