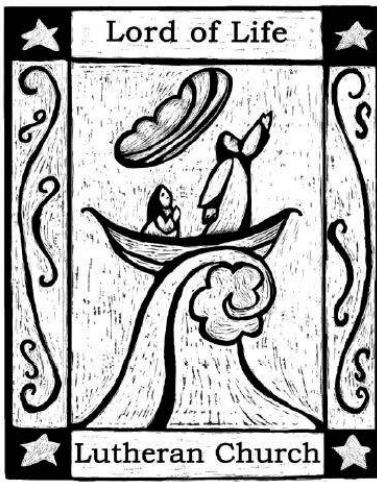

December 1st begins a new month, and a new church year (Advent). Happy New Year to all!!

We are all once again filled with anticipation at the news of the coming of the Savior, the story never grows old. "Advent" consists of four weeks before Christmas. The name of the first season of the liturgical year comes from a Latin word meaning "coming" in three ways: the infant Jesus coming into the past, two millennia ago in Bethlehem; Christ coming in the present by word and sacraments and in the fellowship of communion of the church; and Christ coming again in the future at the end time. In Advent we prepare for the celebration of Christ's coming in the incarnation, but more importantly we prepare for his second coming, when he will make all things new and judge the world in righteousness. The preferred color for Advent is blue, the color of hope. "

The Advent Wreath which originated in home use in Europe after the Reformation, is a wreath on which four candles are placed near the altar. The Jesse Tree is decorated with symbols portraying the spiritual heritage of Jesus. It is a kind of family tree that was suggested by Isaiah's prophesy: "A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse", Isaiah 11:1.

Members of the congregation and Altar Guild will meet on Sat. December 7th at 10 am to help set up the Chrismon Tree (Christ inspired ornaments) and again on Monday December 23rd at 10 am to decorate the church for Christmas Eve services. Any member of the congregation is welcome to help. The next meeting will be on January 11th followed by a covered dish luncheon.

Thank you to Karen Post for setting the altar for November and to all who donated wine and baked bread.

HARRIOTT: A REVIEW

As I am working out I usually have a book that I am reading while on exercise equipment. People ask me what I am reading. I have been asked three times as I read the book "Harriet, Imagining a Life" and each time when I told them, the questioner did not know who Harriet Tubman was. Thus, if nothing else, the movie gave Harriet Tubman, one of the most extraordinary personas in American history, exposure to the American public. So this is a movie from which we can learn something.

So I will start with her name. Harriet Tubman was not her name given at birth. She took the last name Tubman, which was the name of her first husband, even though when she escaped slavery he took up with another woman. Harriet was her mother's name which she took up when she escaped slavery. Her name originally was Araminty Ross.

She escapes her life of slavery in Eastern Shore, Maryland as a young woman in her twenties. She made the journey of a hundred miles alone to Philadelphia. That was astounding enough, but she almost immediately went back to bring others, namely, her family, out of slavery as well.

A two hour movie cannot even begin to get the story of this amazing woman right or be all-inclusive. Very little is mentioned of her time in the north for example. The book about her sums up who she was after an incident in Troy, New York when she helped stop an extradition of a former slave back to a plantation in Virginia. She was "like a mythical hero, a savior, who drops down at the exact moment of greatest need; fights, conquers, and vanishes" while becoming one of the most important conductors of the Underground Railroad. She "never ran her train off the track and never lost a passenger."

When asked how she could do all that she did

alone, she said she was never alone. God was always with her, and she believed God was guiding her. She would experience "spells" in which God spoke to her. Harriet, the woman of action, the agent of change, was fused with a unique spirituality & relationship with God.

Some might say the film is not historically accurate. Honestly, there is much that is a mystery about Harriet so in the film we do not experience much of her actual journey or her itinerary. We know that to do all she did she would have needed help. The film makes it simple by including a convert to her cause, Walter, who assists her on the railroad. The book I read mentions safe houses, and some of her important contacts which are left out in the film. Similar to the notion that we know who created the earth, God, but how He did it we leave to science. What is known about Harriet's accomplishments were talked about and put to paper long after the fact just as Scripture was written long after the events happened. Thus, some facts about this woman of valor may be omitted, embellished, interpreted or misinterpreted. For sure, Harriet was working her magic the same time period another woman of valor, Lakshmibai, warrior queen of Jhansi, was leading the first rebellion against the British in India. Both Harriet and Lakshmibai will be mentioned during our midweek Advent worship in relationship to Rahab the spy and Queen Esther respectively.

Cynthia Erivo is terrific as the determined, athletic Harriet who signals slaves of her intentions through her songs which Cynthia belts out with subdued emotion. I consider "Harriet" a must see movie; and if you do, stay alert until the very end when, at least I was and you might be also, in for a historic surprise.

It will be included in next summer's spiritual cinema.

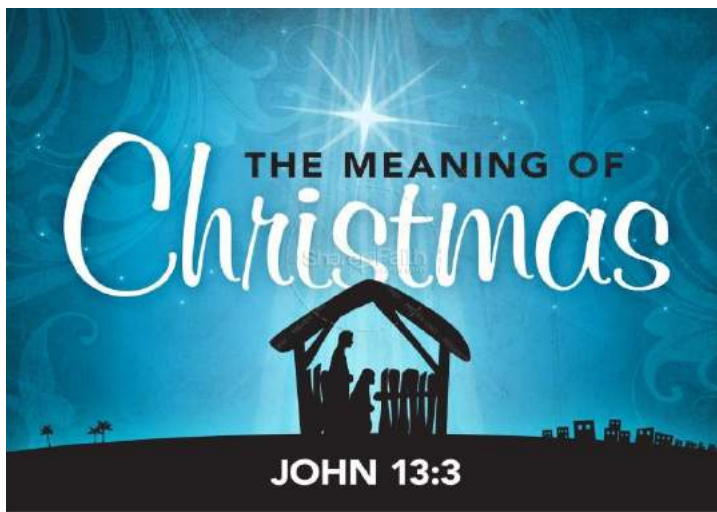
