

## From the Desk of Your Congregation Council:

During the March 2023 Council Meeting, we met with a representative from the Synod and reviewed "Holy Conversations – 10 options for congregations considering a vital and sustainable future" provided by the North Carolina Synod. The 10 options were categorized in three ways:

- Choosing Transformation: making significant change to current context from within to connect with God's mission. Options include intentional vitality process, redevelopment, and sale of the building.
- Choosing Partnership: engaging in shared ministry with another congregation(s) for the sake of the gospel. Options include yoking, merger, consolidation, and anchor church models.
- Choosing Resurrection: embracing the end with belief in the promise that God is doing a new thing. Options include closing and re-opening, word & service mission post, and holy closure.

As a team, we chose Transformation. Transformation as described in the booklet "is a God-driven process that takes something that exists and makes it anew". As I reflect on 2023, with the Holy Spirit hard at work through the Synod and individuals, it has truly been a year of transformation at Lord of Life Lutheran in Garner, North Carolina.

2023 was a very busy year for the Congregation Council. Beginning with the call process for a new part-time Pastor. Then we were approached by Able to Serve, who

wanted to purchase property from Lord of Life so that they may continue to grow their ministry. In August we saw the departure of our Minister of Music, who had led us in music for twenty-three years, causing us to begin looking for a replacement. Just one of these agenda items would be an undertaking for any Congregation Council, but with a strong leadership team and the help and guidance of the Holy Spirit we have continued to keep moving forward.

We were blessed in having Pastor John Petry join us as our interim. This provided some much-needed change and stabilization for the congregation. As a leadership team we set some very simple objectives for the year. Raise and stabilize our weekly attendance, which was a focus for everyone during the Lenten season. We now have a core group of + / - 45 attendees each week and we notice when someone is absent during worship. I consider this a great accomplishment because it established a "new normal" following the pandemic. We also committed to protecting our building. We established rental agreements for those using our facilities. We recognized that there was a lot of wear and tear on our facilities and that we should receive some sort of compensation to help with maintenance.

As your Council President, I have the unique opportunity to see how the Holy Spirit has been working hard at Lord of Life over the past year. It all began with the Synod's recommendation of Pastor John Petry as our interim. Through Pastor John we made the connection with Christ the King Lutheran in Cary. Through this connection, we learned that Christ the King was looking to expand in Southern Wake County. Although they were not certain how or where they would expand, they did approach Lord of Life with an Accompanying Model for consideration. Also, through this connection we have had guest

musicians from Christ the King supply for us while we look for a new Minister of Music. In parallel Pastor Wolfgang Herz-Lane, the Senior Pastor at Christ the King, had submitted his paperwork to the Synod for a part-time Pastoral position. He is set to retire from his full-time position mid-February 2024, but was not guite ready for full-time retirement. Through the call process, Pastor Wolfgang was presented to the Council as the primary candidate and was unanimously approved. In addition to this connection with Christ the King, we were approached by our long time "partner" Able to Serve about purchasing some of our property. If approved, the sale of the property would not only allow Lord of Life to pay off the mortgage, but it would also allow us the financing required to really grow moving forward.

January 2024 will be a very busy month at Lord of Life. We will have something going on every Sunday, beginning with the final meeting of the current Council Sunday, January 7<sup>th</sup>. During the following three weeks everyone's attendance is requested.

- ❖ January 14<sup>th</sup>: Pastor Wolfgang Herz-Lane and his family will join us for worship and then there will be a question-and-answer meet and greet during Fellowship. It will be an opportunity for you as members to ask questions and vice versa.
- January 21<sup>st</sup>: We will have two Special Congregation Meetings. The first will be for the Call and the Terms of the Call for Pastor Wolfgang Herz-Lane. We will close out the first meeting and then have a second meeting to vote on the offer from Able to Serve to purchase property from Lord of Life.
- January 28<sup>th</sup>: Will be our Annual Congregation Meeting to affirm by vote new council members and vote on the 2024 operating budget.

We are not yet done with our transformation, but we are well on our way. Hopefully all of you see that we are in a much better place January 2024 compared to January 2023. With the continued help and guidance of the Holy Spirit, I trust that we will be in an even better place come January 2025. The future of Lord of Life Lutheran in Garner, North Carolina is bright.

A Blue Christmas virtual service was held on Thursday, December 21<sup>st</sup> to offer a safe place to bring your grief, fear and loss through brief readings, quiet and reflective music and prayer.

The last week in February, Lutheran Disaster Relief is planning a work week in New Bern to help Craven County Disaster Recovery, the effects of Hurricane Florence in 2018. LDR Carolinas is looking for people to help with this recovery effort.

#### **The Accompanying Model:**

Struggling churches partner with vibrant ones for a season. They remain independent but come alongside a healthy church for a time of coaching and encouragement until they regain their stability. At that time, the goal is for them to dissolve the partnership so that they can multiply this model and become a coaching site for others. This coaching model also applies to using anchor churches to launch new worshipping sites to provide them the leadership, members, resources, and vitality to begin strong with the intention of making them independent within 3 – 5 years.

#### **Accompaniment / Mutual Transformation:**

We recognize that many struggling congregations possess a rich history and organizational memory of a day and time when they were vibrant and alive. Thinking of closing or being assimilated into another congregation can be a stumbling block toward redevelopment and renewal. The Coaching Model allows a struggling congregation to maintain its autonomy while being accompanied by a vitalized congregation that is also engaging in a re-visioning and strategic development process of its own. Both congregations benefit through the partnership and focused strategic development. While rebuilding the struggling partner congregation, the anchor congregation develops a cuttingedge perspective enabling it to grow and also remain vitalized and relevant.

#### **Strategy:**

- A covenant is created to define the relationship between the two congregations.
- 2. The staff of the anchor congregation serves as a resource for the partner congregation.
- 3. The two congregations assess where they can overlap and/or collaborate (e.g. confirmation, web development, printing of materials, outreach initiatives).
- 4. The process of redevelopment includes:
  - a. A period for relationship and trust building
  - b. Generating new guiding statements (6-12 months) as needed
  - c. Creating a 3-phase strategic plan
  - d. Accompaniment for 3 to 5 years

#### Pay it Forward:

With the rapidly changing North American context, all congregations must practice an ongoing redevelopment cycle every 3 to 5 years. The hope is that after 3 to 5 years of accompaniment, the congregation being redeveloped will be on the path to new life and ready to repeat the process on their own. When doing so, we hope that they will become the anchor congregation for one or two other struggling congregations to introduce them to the process. The plan is for this "pay it forward" model to gain significant traction throughout the greater church over the next 10 to 15 years.

#### REV. DR. WOLFGANG D. HERZ-LANE BIOGRAPHY

Pastor Wolfgang D. Herz-Lane has been serving as senior pastor of Christ the King Lutheran Church,

Christ the King Lutheran Church, Cary, NC, since November 2016.

Born in the Black Forest in southern Germany and educated initially as a newspaper reporter and editor, Pastor Wolfgang came to the United States as a 21-year-old full-time volunteer. Raised as a Roman Catholic, he was working as a youth and parish worker for the Lutheran Churches of Camden, New Jersey, then as now one of the poorest places in America, and as the executive director of a faithbased social services agency called The Good Samaritan Center (1975-1977 and 1978-1992). He was later called to serve as mission director for the New Jersey Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (1992-2000), leading the synod's mission development efforts as well as urban ministry initiatives.




Ordained in 2001, Pastor

Wolfgang then became a mission developer, working to build a new multicultural congregation from the ground up. When he left Bridge of Peace Community Church six years later, the worshipping community there was one-third white, one-third Black, and one-third Latinx.

Between 2006 and 2010, he served as mission director again, this time in the Delaware-Maryland and Metro Washington DC Synods of the ELCA. He was elected Bishop of the Delaware-Maryland Synod and served one term until 2016.

Pastor Wolfgang holds a Master of Social Work degree from Rutgers University, New Brunswick, NJ (1982); a Master of Divinity degree from the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia (2001); and a Doctor of Ministry degree from United Lutheran Seminary, Philadelphia/Gettysburg (2018).

He has been married to the Rev. Margaret E. Herz-Lane, a now retired African-American pastor, for 40 years; the couple have two adult sons and two grandchildren.







Our Parish Committee has had various responsibilities over the years, including our current responsibilities listed below.

- Ministry Fair Annual event held around October/November timeframe. We coordinate scheduling of this event for all ministries and groups.
  - We share light snacks and share about what our committee does. We also provide our time & talents sheets at our table, which offers the opportunity for those wishing to volunteer their non-monetary gifts to our church.
- Annual Stewardship Campaign encourage monetary giving through
   distributing Financial Pledge Cards to the
   entire congregation. They're distributed
   through member mailboxes and passing
   out with bulletins at the beginning of
   worship. After calculating a total for
   pledges, we share this total with the
   council to help develop our budget for the
   following year.
- LOL List We maintain a list of recommended contractors for our church family and others. We have hard copies of list in a wall pocket on bulletin board directly across from our members' mailboxes. This list is also available on our LOL website under Links/LOL List.
- <u>Cards</u> Volunteers from our group currently send out Get Well/ Encouragement and Sympathy cards to our church family.

- <u>Pictures</u> Formerly, we had a member directory with pictures of our entire congregation. Currently, we have pictures on bulletin board in Fellowship Hall, which needs to be updated. We're currently working on updating.
- After Service Fellowship We have a variety of food options/snacks following each worship service. The most challenging tasks are cleanup, dishwashing and drying. Guidelines for hosting or helping with Fellowship are posted on board next to signup sheet.
  - Whoever hosts fellowship can determine how much or little they provide.
  - We discussed recruiting backup help when Parish members are unavailable or short-handed (primarily cleanup duties)
  - We just updated our Fellowship Signup sheet to include room for volunteers who wish to Host, Setup, or Cleanup to provide more resources.

We enjoy our fellowship time after service and having the opportunity to share in inviting, casual conversations with our church family, guests and visitors.

Those of us old enough to remember when the phone was wired to the wall, usually in the kitchen, can relate to this story.



When I was a young boy, my father had one of the first telephones in our neighborhood. I remember the polished, old case fastened to the wall. The shiny receiver hung on the side of the box. I was too little to reach it, but used to listen with fascination when my mother talked to it.

Then I discovered that somewhere inside the wonderful device lived an amazing person. Her name was "Information Please" and there was nothing she did not know. Information Please could supply anyone's number and the correct time.

My personal experience with the genie-in-a-bottle came one day while my mother was visiting a neighbor. Amusing myself at the tool bench in the basement, I whacked my finger with a hammer. The pain was terrible, but there seemed no point in crying because there was no one home to give sympathy. I walked around the house sucking my throbbing finger, finally arriving at the stairway. The telephone! Quickly, I ran for the footstool in the parlor and dragged it to the landing. Climbing up, I unhooked the receiver and held it to my ear. "Information, Please," I said into the mouthpiece just above my head.

A click or two and a small clear voice spoke into my ear. "Information."

"I hurt my finger..." I wailed into the phone, the tears came readily enough now that I had an audience.

"Isn't your mother home?" came the question. "Nobody's home but me," I blubbered. "Are you bleeding?" the voice asked. "No," I replied. "I hit my finger with the hammer and it hurts." "Can you open the icebox?" she asked. I said I could. "Then chip off a little bit of ice and hold it to your finger," said the voice.

After that, I called "Information Please" for everything. I asked her for help with my geography, and she told me where Philadelphia was. She helped me with my math. She told me my pet chipmunk I caught in the park just the day before would eat fruit and nuts. Then, there was the time Petey, our pet canary, died. I called, "Information Please," and told her the sad story. She listened, and then said things grown-ups say to soothe a child. But I was not consoled. I asked her, "Why is it that birds should sing so beautifully and bring joy to all families, only to end up as a heap of feathers on the bottom of a cage?" She must have sensed my deep concern, for she said quietly, "Wayne, always remember that there are other worlds to sing in." Somehow I felt better.

Another day I was on the telephone, "Information Please." "Information," said in the now familiar voice. "How do I spell fix?" I asked.

All this took place in a small town in the Pacific Northwest. When I was 9 years old, we moved across the country to Boston. I missed my friend very much. "Information Please" belonged in that old wooden box back home and I somehow never thought of trying the shiny new phone that sat on the table in the hall. As I grew into my teens, the memories of those childhood conversations never really left me. Often, in moments of doubt and perplexity, I would recall the serene sense of security I had then. I appreciated now how patient, understanding, and kind she was to have spent her time on a little boy.

A few years later on my way west to college, my plane put down in Seattle. I had about a half-hour or so between planes. I spent 15 minutes or so on the phone with my sister. Then without thinking what I was doing, I dialed my hometown operator and said, "Information Please." Miraculously, I heard the small, clear voice I knew so well. "Information."

I hadn't planned this, but I heard myself saying, "Could you please tell me how to spell fix?" There was a long pause. Then came the soft spoken answer, "I guess your finger must have healed by now."

I laughed, "So it's really you," I said. "I wonder if you have any idea how much you meant to me during that time?"

"I wonder," she said, "if you know how much your calls meant to me. I never had any children and I used to look forward to your calls."

I told her how often I had thought of her over the years and I asked if I could call her again when I came back to visit my sister.

"Please do," she said. "Just ask for Sally."

Three months later I was back in Seattle. A different voice answered, "Information." I asked for Sally. "Are you a friend?" she said. "Yes, a very old friend," I answered. "I'm sorry to have to tell you this," she said. "Sally had been working part time the last few years because she was sick. She died five weeks ago."

Before I could hang up, she said, "Wait a minute, did you say your name was Wayne?" "Yes" I answered. Well, Sally left a message for you. She wrote it down in case you called. Let me read it to you. The note said, "Tell him there are other worlds to sing in. He'll know what I mean."

I thanked her and hung up. I knew what Sally meant.

Never underestimate the impression you may make on others. Whose life have you touched today?




